hen buying recycled paper products here are some things to keep in mind. Don't assume "100% recycled" means made 100% from your old junk mail "Post-consumer content" is the paper we've collected for recycling, the rest is industrial waste left over from paper manufacturing. Try to get a high post-consumer content. Look for paper that has been de-inked to remove harmful inks and dyes without adding chlorine. Bleaching with chlorine creates dioxins, highly toxic pollutants, and is unnecessary

ROYAL BROCCOLI **CASSEROLE**

2 cups chopped, cooked broc

- 1 large onion, chopped 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 teaspoon salt
- % teaspoon tarragon or marjo-
- % teaspoon pepper 1 pint sour cream

Place broccoli in buttered 1-quart casserole. Sauté onion in butter until soft and add to broccoli. Add


