

Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was about moderate and sufficient to keep offerings in fairly good balance, particular-ly on 3 pound and smaller sizes. Over 3 ound sizes were fully adequate but clearing. Live supplies were moderate; weights ere heavier than desired at most plants. Processing schedules were heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 52 to 63 cents. Trade sentiment was steady. In the part complex, wings remained in active demand, and supplies were firmly held. Leg quarters were available and difficult to place. Breast items were adequate, instances ample and slow

NATIONAL EGG MARKET - AT A GLANCE: Prices for extra large and large trended unchanged to higher in the Mid-Atlantic region; otherwise, prices were unchanged. The trade sentiment was generally steady. Movement of cartoned eggs into retail channels was rated as moderate in all reporting areas. Supplies were ample on the West Coast, adequate elsewhere around the country. In the Central States, prices for nest run breaking stock trended lower, checks and undergrades were unchanged. Trading was light to moderate, Offerings were adequate to instances fully adequate. The undertone was cautiously steady. In the Southeast, trading in light hens was too thin to report prices. Movement off the farms covered processing plant schedules. Demand was only fair and unaggressive. The undertone was steady,
