NOT JUST ANOTHER NOVEL

Born June 14 1811 Harriet Beecher Stowe was the daughter of clergyman Lyman Beecher, sister of the prominent Reverend Henry Ward Beecher and wife of Calvin Ellis Stowe, a theological seminary professor. But she is best remembered as the author of the antislavery novel *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. The furor surrounding the book's publication in 1852 resulted in unparalleled popularity (it was translated into at least 23 languages) and created a profound political impact — so much so that it can rightly be counted among the contributing causes to the Civil War. President Lincoln acknowledged this when he met Mrs. Stowe during the war and is said to have said to her, "So you're the little woman who wrote the book that made this great war."

ASPARAGUS SALAD

- 2 pounds fresh asparagus
- 1 cup sour cream
- 3 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- ½ cup fresh chopped parsley
- 1 tablespoon chopped chives
- ½ teaspoon tarragon
- ½ teaspoon salt
- pinch pepper

Remove tough ends from asparagus and steam until tender, but crisp. Drain and plunge into cold water, drain again. Cut asparagus into 1½-inch pieces, place in salad bowl. Combine other ingredients, mix well, and pour over asparagus. Toss gently.

Makes 4 to 6 servings.

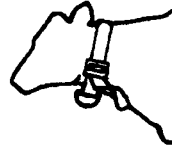

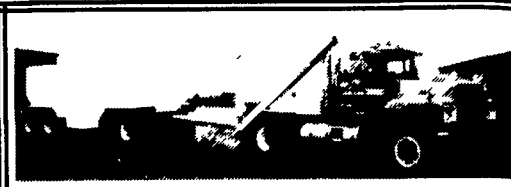

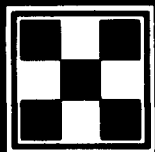
