AMELIA'S OUTFIT

Amelia Bloomer was a women's rights advocate and publisher and editor of *The Lily*, America's first periodical edited entirely by a woman. But it was her involvement in the dress reform movement for which she is best remembered. Stating that the hooped skirts of her day were immodest, drafty, and cumbersome, she simply refused to wear the popular fashion. Her preferred costume was a pair of baggy trousers, gathered at the ankles, with a short belted tunic. When she appeared in such an outfit to deliver a Fourth of July address in 1853, she created quite a sensation. Although other feminists of the day soon adopted this style of dress, it was Mrs. Bloomer whose name became forever associated with the pantaloons.

STRAWBERRY-ORANGE DESSERT

4 cups fresh strawberries
1/2 cup orange juice
2/3 cup brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon grated orange peel
2 cups plain yogurt



Wash and hull strawberries and cut in half. Marinate berries in orange juice for an hour. Combine sugar, peel, and yogurt. Stir in berries and soaking juice. Serve in parfait glasses.

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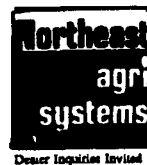
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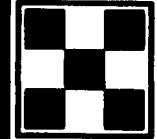
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
