

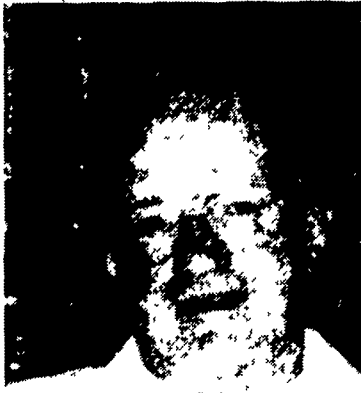
Sutherland To Retire

ITHACA, N.Y. — Executive manager of the New York Holstein Association, Hugh Sutherland has announced his retirement effective July 15, 1993.

Sutherland's responsibilities have been to plan and execute programs of the state breed organization, which include shows, sales, educational meetings, and cattle merchandising. He has carried out these duties for 15 years.

Prior to becoming executive manager, he served the association at the local and state level through involvement on various committees, including a term as state president from 1975-76. He has also been involved in numerous other agricultural and community organizations over the years.

Sutherland graduated from SUNY Delhi in 1950 with his A.A.S. degree in animal husbandry. Upon graduation, he accepted a position as assistant herdsman for the Beacon Dairy Research Farm in Cayuga, N.Y. Between

1953 and 1955, he held several farm management positions.

He worked with such outstanding herds as Miller Acres Farm, Billings, N.Y.; Maraview Farm,

Marathon, N.Y.; and Ed Don George, North Java, N.Y. He also served in the U.S. Army from 1955-57.

From 1957 to 1982, Sutherland owned Chapel Bank Farm, Delhi, N.Y. The herd was well recognized and highly respected, with more than 30 bulls from the herd entered A.I. organizations, numerous cattle exported to several foreign countries, and an aggressive merchandising program which was developed and maintained.

The Chapel Bank, Delhi, milking herd was sold in the spring of 1978, with heifers being retained to form a nucleus for a continued Chapel Bank herd.

In 1982, Sutherland became a partner in the development of the Chapel Bank, Hobart, registered Holstein herd. A son, David, has now taken over the farm.

Hugh and his wife, Irene, have four children, including sons John and David; daughters Sharon and Diane; and three grandchildren.

SRBC To Meet At Inner Harbor

HARRISBURG (Dauphin Co.) — The Susquehanna River Basin Commission is to meet 1 p.m., July 8, at the Baltimore Marriott Inner Harbor, Baltimore, Md.

According to a news release, the agenda of the meeting is to include a review of staff accomplishments during the past six months and of its goals for the next six.

Also on the slate is:

- consideration of a ground water management plan for the basin;

- endorsement of an enforcement procedure for ensuring that those entities whose water-use projects have been approved comply with submitting reports and paying monitoring fees;

- assessment of a penalty against Ski Snowpeak, for failure to submit its annual monitoring report and fee;

- revision of the SRBC's Organizational Manual (which governs the SRBC's internal operations);
- ratification of three contracts;

- review a proposed water use registration regulation.

Of those applications, specifically, the Hallstead System under the Northeast District of Pennsylvania-American Water Company, seeks up to .35 million gallons per day from the water company's Susquehanna Sytem, also within the company's Northeast District; Dover Township seeks to purchase up to 1 million gallons per day from the York Water Company; and Ashland Area Municipal Authority is seeking to withdraw up to .8 million gallons per day from Ashland Reservoir, an impoundment of the Little Mahanoy Creek, for its public water supply, and also to purchase up to .6 million gallons a day from Roaring Creek Water Company, of Schuylkill County.

In addition to those items, the SRBC is hear reports on basin hydrologic conditions; the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' STEL-LA computer model.

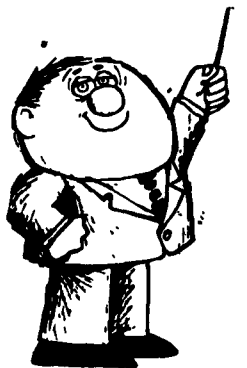
