A mass of Friday shoppers waited patiently licking their lips in anticipation of this cool treat on a hot June day. Firestone said they would hand out free dishes of ice cream until it was gone and 500 dishes later, it was.

"If we did this before, this is the first time in a long time," Firestone said, seemingly quite pleased with the response.

In addition to the Outstanding Young Cooperator, four runnersup were named. They are Evan J. and Lori A. Burkholder of Fayetteville, District 15, second place: James E. and Debra Krantz of Quarryville, District 12, third

place; Gary L. and Claudia L. Bechtel of Curryville, District 20, fourth place; and Gary W. and Gail L. Thoman of Dallastown, District 16, fifth place.

As the top five winners, these young farmers will be named to Atlantic's Young Cooperator Consultant Committee for a threeyear term. They are to join the 1991 and 1992 winners in developing and planning Young Cooperator activities for the coming year.

In addition, Bower and the Burkholders will attend the National Milk Producers Federation annual meeting Nov. 28-Dec. 3 in New Orleans, La. The Krantzes, Bechtels and Thomans are to attend the National Institute on Cooperative Education July 26-29 in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Judges for the contest were Joyce Bupp, a York County dairy farmer and director of Dairymen Inc.; Garry Hennip, Northeast Division Sales and Service director for Sire Power; and Cal Wettstein, a retired extension agent

Contestants for Atlantic Dairy Cooperative's Young Cooperator program are selected by the cooperative's membership districts. The contest itself is a culmination of a yearlong program providing cooperative education and leadership training to the

participants.




