After entertainment of the Masters singing trio. Jennifer crowned Susan and presented her with her banner and rose spray.


Susan M. Willey, 17, is the

It seems that food rules my life. So much of my time is spent planning to grow, harvest, preserve and use food. And, don't forget all of that weeding.
