DAILY NATIONAL GRAIN SUMMARY WEATHER THE MAJOR SUPPORT FACTOR IN HIGHER GRAIN AND SOYBEAN PRICES, WEDNESDAY ALONG WITH GOOD EXPORT DEMAND FOR WHEAT. WHEAT 1 TO 4 CENTS HIGHER. CORN 2 TO 13 CENTS HIGHER. SORGHUM 5 TO 6 CENTS HIGHER. SOYBEANS 10 TO 22 CENTS HIGHER. WET WEATHER CONTINUED TO DELAY KANSAS WHEAT HARVEST AS WATER LAPPING AT MANY ELEVATOR DOORS. ALGERIA'S PURCHASE OF 149,375 TONNES HARD RED WINTER WHEAT AND OTHER INTERESTS, ADDED SUPPORT TO PRICES. CORN PRICES SLIGHTLY HIGHER AGAIN, BOOSTED BY ADDITIONAL RAIN IN CORN BELT AREAS. RIVERS CONTINUE TO POUR OVER LEVEES AND RECORD FLOOD STAGES REPORTED. EVACUATIONS OF HOMES AND BUSINESSES CONTINUE AND MANY TOWN WATER SUPPLIES HAVE BEEN CONTAMINATED. SHARP GAINS IN SOYBEAN PRICES DUE ALSO TO ONGOING FLOODING IN MIDWEST AREAS. SEVEN DOLLAR SOYBEANS AND THREATS OF WATER DAMAGE AT COUNTRY ELEVATORS AND FARMERS STORAGE BINS STARTED THE SOYBEAN GRAIN TRAILERS ROLLING. ESTIMATES OF SOYBEAN ACRES UNDER WATER, INCREASING DAILY AS NEW LEVEES BREAK AND SOME PREDICTIONS NOW WELL OVER 5 MILLION ACRES.

Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds ranged light to good and best on tight supplies of over 3 pound sizes. Smaller sizes were adequate. Live supplies were moderate overall. Weights were light to desirable, mostly light. Processing schedules were very heavy. Less than truckload asking prices were unchanged to 1 cent higher at 53 to 65 cents. Trade sentiment was fully steady to higher. Bone-in breast were no more than adequate; boneless skinless were fully adequate. Leg items ranged fully adequate to ample and excess was slow in clearing. Hand cut wings were in good balance; however, machine cuts were read-

ily available.
