Delco 4-H Receives Grants

MEDIA (Delaware Co.) — Delaware County 4-H has received two youth organization grants from the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture totaling \$17,500.

The general purpose of this grant program is to increase knowledge and awareness of agriculture among the youth of the state. In Delaware County, the grants will be used to support the educational programs and renovations at the 4-H Farm and Educational Center on the property of the Garrett-Williamson Foundation on Bishop Hollow Road, Newtown Square.

More than four thousand youth

participate in the educational programs conducted from this location each year, according to Bud Bryan, Delaware County 4-H coordinator.

The grants consist of a \$2,500 direct grant for educational programs relating to agriculture and a matching grant of \$15,000 for capital expenditures and equipment related to agricultural education for youth. Volunteers in 4-H are working hard this year to raise the necessary funds to match this grant. No money from tax sources can be used for the match.

A recent visit from Boyd E. Wolff, Pennsylvania secretary of agriculture, included a tour of the 4-H Center and a presentation celebrating the state support of 4-H in Delaware County. 4-H members from throughout Delaware County showed Wolff the animals and poultry they are raising at the farm and discussed some of the educational programs they participate in there. Parents and adult volunteers also had an opportunity to discuss 4-H programs with the secretary.
