PATENT PENDING

In July 31, 1790, the U.S. government issued its first patent, granted to Samuel Hopkins of Vermont, for a process of making potash and pearl ashes Signed by President George Washington, Secretary of State Thomas Jefferson and Attorney General Edmund Randolph, the patent was one of only three granted that year. It was not until May 1802. that the Patent Office was organized as a distinct entity "to have charge of the issuing of patents," and consecutive numbering was not instituted until 1836. By 1833 about 9,000 patents had been issued and the Superintendent felt it was time for him to resign since "everything seems to have been done" Of course, the Office continued and has now issued over 4.5 million patents


