## ADC GM Paul Hand Set To Retire

SOUTHAMPTON (Bucks Co.) — Dr. Paul E. Hand is to retire from his post as general manager and secretary of Atlantic Dairy Cooperative on July 31 but will remain active as an Atlantic representative in industry affairs.

Hand, 62, has served as general manager and secretary of Atlantic for the past 11 years. Assuming his daily duties will be Robert M. Dever, 49, who currently serves as assistant general manager and assistant secretary.

Hand joined Atlantic's staff in 1957 as an economist. In this position, he testified at numerous state and federal milk order hearings on behalf of the cooperative's dairy

farmers. He also became involved in developing policies and programs for the cooperative.

By 1960, Hand was elected assistant secretary by the board of directors. In 1971, the board further showed its support of Hand's abilities by naming him assistant general manager. He was appointed general manager and secretary in 1982, following the retirement of Dr. James E. Honan.

Throughout his career, Hand has been recognized as an expert on milk marketing and pricing issues. He served on a number of industry boards, including the National Milk Producers Federation (NMPF), the American Dairy Pro-

ducts Institute (ADPI) and Dairy Council Inc. He will continue to serve as an Atlantic representative on both the NMPF and ADPI boards.

Hand also has been praised for his leadership of Atlantic Dairy Cooperative, which is one of the nation's top 10 milk marketing cooperatives.

"Atlantic made much progress during Paul Hand's tenure," said Robert B. McSparran, a Lancaster County dairy farmer and president of the cooperative. "He guided the successful merger that formed Atlantic in 1987 and is credited with the strong financial position the cooperative enjoys today."

While expressing appreciation for Hand's "valuable contributions" to Atlantic's growth, McSparran said that he and the board of directors look forward to continued progress under new general manager and secretary Robert M. Dever.

"Bob Dever was the obvious choice of the board," McSparran said. "He has been with Atlantic for more than two decades and has worked closely with Paul Hand for the past 10 years."

Dever joined Atlantic's staff in 1970 as payroll department supervisor. He was elected treasurer in 1974 and was named assistant general manager and assistant se-

cretary in 1983. He most recently was responsible for negotiating raw milk sales and in overseeing the accounting, transportation and data processing functions.

Dever graduated from Drexel University in 1965 with a degree in accounting. He received his master's in business administration in 1972 from Temple University. He previously was employed by the USDA Market Administrator as an auditor.

Atlantic Dairy Cooperative represents more than 3,550 dairy farm families in Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia.
