But with the funds from this annual auction, the clinic has been able to offer this service to their clients at a price that is affordable to the average parent.

LANCASTER (Lancaster Co.)—Food, animals, games and kids will fill the Lampeter Fairgrounds Aug. 11 through 13 when the Lancaster County 4-H Fair season.

The fair is a showcase for myriad projects 4-H'ers have completed in the past year. Visitors will have the opportunity to view everything imaginable from scrapbooks to sheep. But exhibits are just a part of the fair, which also includes contests, food and game booths, and presentations that allow 4-H'ers to demonstrate their skill and knowledge.

In addition to the exhibits and booths, fairgoers can select from a busy schedule of daily activities. On Wednesday evening at 8 p.m. fairgoers will be treated to a costume contest — for sheep.
