The 278-pound reserve grand champion was shown by Lillian Lunde and sold to Hatfield Quality Meats Inc. for \$2.10 per pound.

The grand champion steer was shown by Neil Gilliland. The 1,390-pound Angus sold to Wyalusing Livestock Sales for \$1 per pound.

The 1,232-pound reserve grand

champion steer was shown by Rob Gilliland and bought by Troy Sales for 85.75 cents per pound.

The 128-pound grand champion market lamb was shown by Kendra Moore and sold to Farm Credit for \$4.10 per pound. The reserve grand champion lamb, shown by Geoff Powell, weighed 129 pounds and was bought by Troy Veterinarian Hospital for \$2 per pound.

There was also some additional support coming from buyers who stretched the use of their purchases by offering them up again on the auction block with proceeds targeted for helping the county 4-H livestock program youth, either through scholarships or other means.

Wayne Tuscarora and Rolling Acres Farm, of Wysox, each purchased a hog and resold the animal with all re-sale money going to the county 4-H.

During the lamb sale, there were two lambs purchased by Wayne Tuscarora, and one bought by Pelton Trucking which were resold to support 4-H.

A number of buyers provided considerable support in addition to purchasing champions.
