Trucklot buying interest was quite irregular and ranged from quiet to fairly good. Supplies of boneless skinless breasts with tenders were in close balance to adequate and traded at steady prices. Larger volumes of tender cut boneless were short of covering immediate needs. Line run breasts continued to be in very close balance to tight. Again today, very little additional product was offered, some committed deliveries were shorted, and some buying interest went unfilled. However, most buyers were cautious and kept inventories close to immediate needs. Other items were generally adequate and traded at steady prices.
