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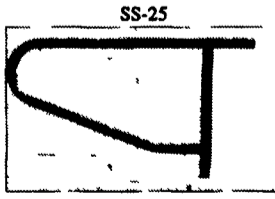
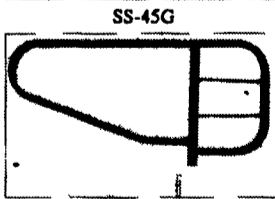
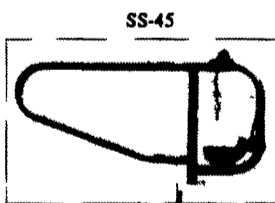


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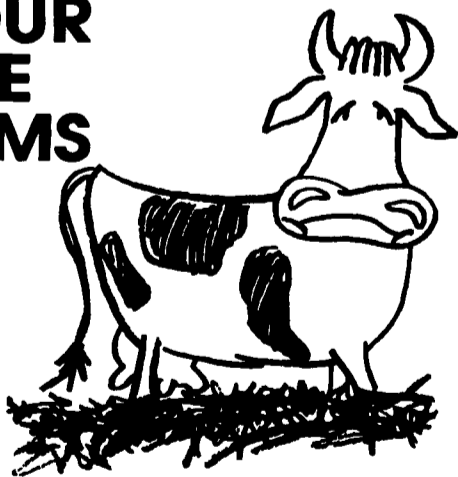
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Programs Help Environment, Save Money

NEWARK, Del. — University of Delaware Cooperative Extension educational programs in nutrient management helped Delaware farmers cut nitrogen applications from fertilizer and manure last year by more than 200,000 pounds on the sandy soils of Sussex County. Besides helping protect groundwater from potential nitrate contamination, participating farmers saved an estimated \$11 an acre.

More than half of this reduced nitrogen load was achieved in the Inland Bays area as part of the state's We C.A.R.E. program. The letters stand for Comprehensive Agricultural Resources Effort — a cooperative five-year project involving the University of Delaware, Sussex Conservation District, Sussex County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Soil Conservation Service and Delaware Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control.

In 1992, the We C.A.R.E. team established nutrient management plans with 28 farmer cooperators on 25,867 acres — 42 percent of the cropland in the designated area. Intensive nutrient management activities include presidedress soil nitrate testing, manure analysis and spreader calibrations, and on-farm demonstrations.

"The Inland Bays area is a good example of the Delaware Cooperative Extension water quality program," said Tom Williams, extension water quality specialist.
