Make A Living

HONESDALE (Wayne Co.) - The living will law went into effect April 16, 1992 in Pennsylvania, but if you haven't checked into a hospital lately you may not have realized it.

Facing a gall bladder surgery, I visited the hospital for my preadmission testing. I had my urine, blood, heart, and lungs checked.

Then I got a surprise. Someone wanted to know about my "advance directives". I shouldn't have been surprised. As county extension director for Penn State Cooperative Extension in Wayne County, I have written articles about living wills and sent out many copies of a Penn State publication "Living Will: Your Advance Directive for Health Care". But somehow I never found the time to sit down and prepare my own living will. Now days before my surgery I must

make the time. It's definitely not the best time to do this, while I'm concerned about my surgery. On the positive side it is forcing me to think about what medical care I want and what I don't want. I'm also talking with my husband and children about these issues. I'm encouraging my husband and 18-year-old daughter to make their own living wills. None of us knows when we

might need this important document. Do yourself and your family a favor - make time now to sit down and discuss this issue.
