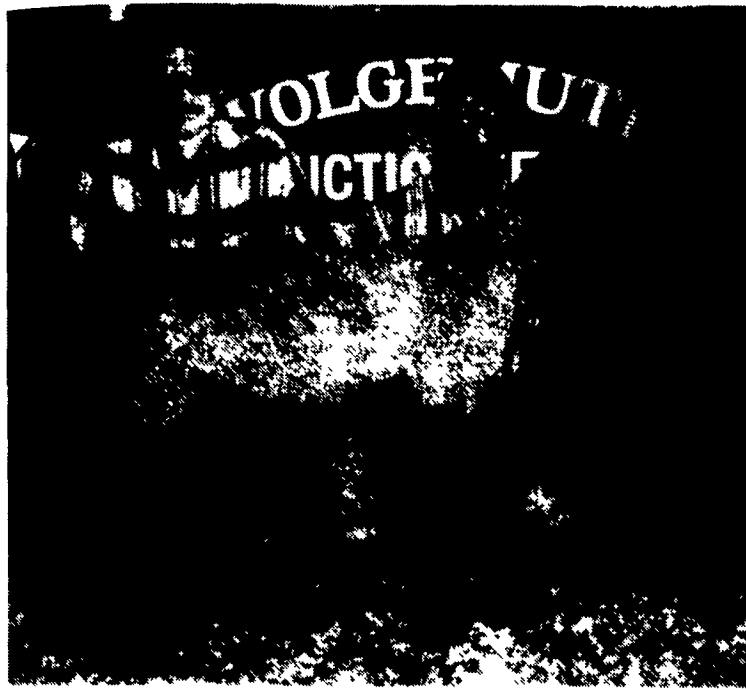


Bollinger Shows Champion

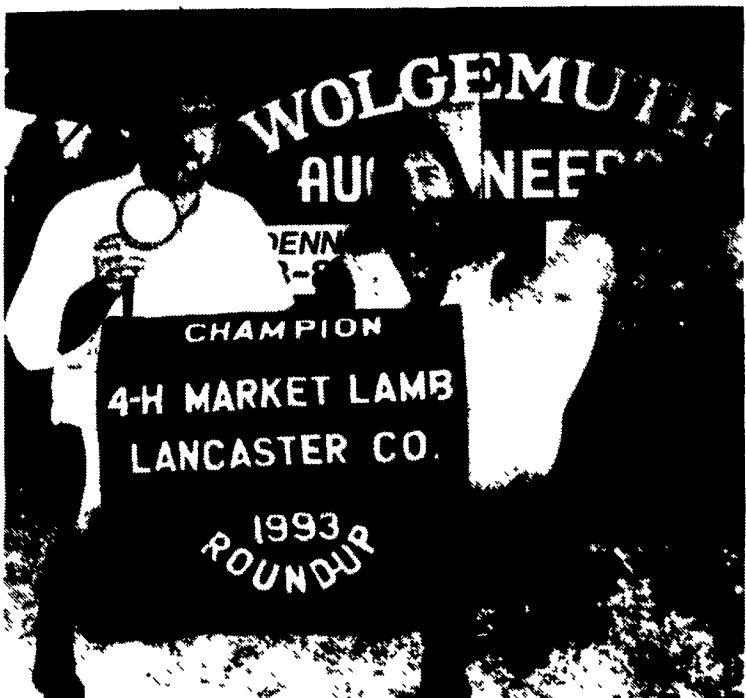

A cousin to Lisa, Kendall Reiff, sold his reserve champion heavyweight for \$2 a pound to Martin's Limestone. Kendall, son of Samuel and Elva Reiff of Ephrata, raises nine Hampshires and Suffolks. His reserve heavyweight was a homebred Hampshire.

"It was the best I ever did. I was really surprised," said 16-year-old Kendall.

The 37 market lambs sold over the auction block on August 12, for an average \$1.29 per pound.

During the afternoon, 40 breeding sheep competed in the ring.

Kerra Allen of Manheim took the Supreme Champion title with her Suffolk ewe lamb named Mississippi. The 12-year-old is the daughter of Keith and Kandy Allen of Manheim. She raises about 12 sheep. The supreme champion was purchased from Breeze View Farms.

Best owned and bred champion was a Dorset owned by Jessica Stoltzfus of Elizabethtown. The Dorset was also named Reserve Supreme Champion.

Mark Tracy's Southdown ewe lamb was named reserve best owned and breed.

Farmers Market Nutrition Program

HONESDALE (Wayne Co.) — The Farmer's Market Nutrition program is looking for Wayne County produce farmers who are interested in selling their produce through this program, according to Debra Bryant, Wayne County extension director. The purpose of the Farmer's Market Nutrition Program is to provide fresh fruits and vegetables to women, infants and children who are nutritionally at risk. At the same time, the program seeks to create new markets for Pennsylvania farmers.

Participants in the Women, Infant and Children (WIC) Supplemental Food Program receive checks that may be used to purchase only fresh, unprocessed fruits and vegetables from Pennsylvania farmers.

If you are a Wayne County vegetable or fruit grower and are interested in selling your produce through this program please contact: Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, Farmer's Market Nutrition Program, 2301 North Cameron St., Harrisburg, PA 17110-9408, (717) 787-5086.

Only Pennsylvania grown fruits and vegetables may be purchased with WIC Farmers' Market Nutrition Program Checks.

Note that citrus fruits (lemons, oranges, limes, grapefruit, tangerines) and topical fruits (bananas, pineapples, mangoes) cannot be purchased with Farmers' Market Nutrition Program checks. These fruits are not grown in Pennsylvania.
