tions. The Davis' and the Powells' formed a partnership in 1987. Since that time, they have increased their herd average by 3,000 pounds. Their herd average is 21,143 milk, 753 fat, 648 protein, and BAA is 104.5. They also developed the Unicorn Chairman Lynn Family resulting in 1st full sold to AI with the Unicorn prefix in 1991 and 5-6 other bulls sold to date. Tom and Cam maintain a strong herd health program, which allows them to increase the portion of income derived from sale of registered cattle.

A strong breeding program results in the overall focus on high producing functionally correct and profitable cows. Breeding decisions are made jointly. High TPI bulls are used with emphasis on pounds of protein, udder strength, correct feet, and legs. Cows are mated individually. A variety of

young sires are also used on repeat been a long-time contributor of breeders.

Along with Catoctin Embryo Transfer, they have developed the Lynn Family through an aggressive flushing program, resulting in A.I. contracts. A small portion of the herd is bred with greater emphasis on show ring type, which broadens merchandising potential. The philosophy of their breeding program is to try and balance the science and art of breeding cows.

Distinguished Service Award This award has traditionally been presented to someone who has made outstanding contributions to the Maryland Holstein Association and its membership other than in the category of a breeder and owner of registered Holsteins. This year, the committee met and decided that deserving people who have made outstanding contributions, even though they also may be breeders, should not be overlooked.
