(Continued from Page 15) tive programs which provide quality best-management practices (BMP) through cooperative programs which provide education, technical assistance and incentives," he said.

Wenstrand emphasized state and local authorities need flexible programs that can be adapted to specific situations. And he stressed farmers prefer programs that rely on voluntary compliance.

Referring to the current \$50 million in funding for Section 319, Wenstrand said, "It should come as little surprise that some states have been less than enthusiastic about enacting vigorous nonpoint source programs when, on average, they can expect to receive less than \$1 million per year to carry them out."

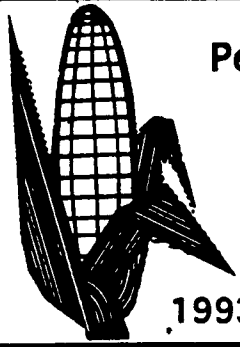
While farmers applaud the Clinton Administration's fiscal 1994 budget proposal to increase funding for Section 319 to \$80 million, Wenstrand expressed disappointment that no 1994 funds were specified for USDA's Water Quality Incentives Program.

"There is ample evidence that when farmers are provided

with information on management practices which minimize erosion and runoff and enhance their economic viability, they are quick to adapt without facing any government mandate," he said. Wenstrand used as an

example his experience with no-till farming, which he first experimented with a decade ago. He now uses a no-till system to farm about 1,500 acres of corn, soybeans, and wheat.

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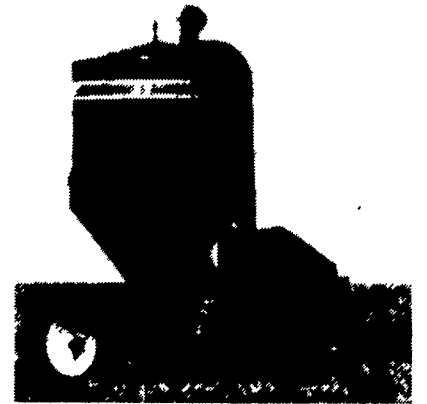
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
