Trucklot buying interest ranged quiet to fairly good. Supplies of boneless skinless breasts were balanced with an improved demand. Trading was at current prices but the undertone was fully steady going into late week. Line run breasts were quite irregular; some product was available and slow to clear but some buyers paid up numbers to book their needs. Leg quarters were available. Buyers and sellers disagree over values; buyers bid lower prices while sellers asked steady prices. Legs, thighs, and drumsticks cleared well. Wings traded at current prices but supplies improved and the undertone was fully steady.

Movement of cartoned eggs into retail channels was light to fairly good, mostly fair. Supplies of larger sizes ranged adequate to instances ample, mediums ranged close balance to adequate. 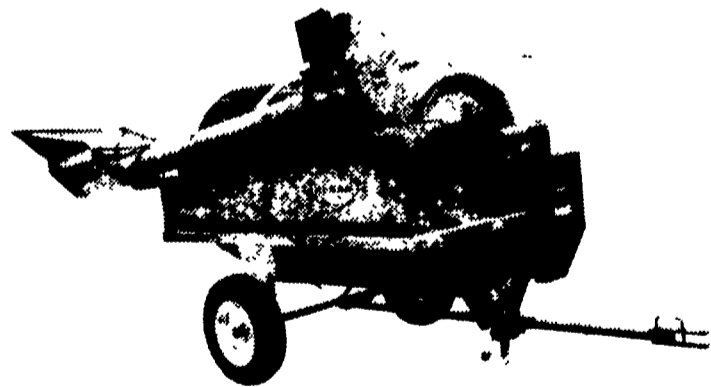
