Buyers and sellers disagree over values; buyers bid lower prices while sellers asked steady prices. Legs, thighs, and drumsticks cleared well. Wings traded at current prices but supplies improved and the undertone was fully steady

NATIONAL EGG MARKET - AT A GLANCE: Prices were unchanged in all reporting areas. The trade sentiment was rated as generally steady but a cautious undertone was noted on the West Coast, in the Southeast and in some areas of the Northeast, Movement of cartoned eggs into retail channels was light to fairly good, mostly fair. Supplies of larger sizes ranged adequate to instances ample, mediums ranged close balance to adequate. Prices for nest run breaking stock in the Central States were unchanged. Trading and demand was light. Offerings were adequate to fully adequate. Most breakers operated off regular commitments. Floor stocks were adequate. The undertone was barely steady. Sales of light type hens in the Southeast were too few to report prices. Demand was moderate. Offerings were irregular. Supplies were fully adequate. The undertone was steady to fully steady.


Prices were unchanged. The trade sentiment was generally steady but a cautious undertone was noted. Movement of cartoned eggs into retail channels was fair and about as expected.
