

Etherton Honored For Research

(Centre Co.) — Dr. Terry D. Etherton, professor of animal science in Penn State's College of Agricultural Sciences, has received the 1993 Alex and Jessie C. Black Award for Excellence in Research. The award was presented September 28 at the beginning of the college's distinguished lecture series.

"I'm elated to be this year's recipient of the Black Award," Etherton said. "It's a distinct honor to be recognized by my collegues.'

Etherton is internationally known as an expert in biotechnology and endocrinology and is a leader in understanding and applying fundamental principles from these fields to increase the effi-

His studies were the first to establish that treating growing pigs with recombiant porcine somatotropin (pST) markedly improves muscle growth, decreases fat deposition, and improves productive efficiency. The Food and Drug Administration is likely to approve pST for use by pork producers within the next two years.

"Dr. Etherton has made significant contributions to animal biotechnology," said Dr. Stanley E. Curtis, professor and head of dairy and animal science. "His work has furthered both our understanding of growth biology and application of this knowledge to agricultural animals."
