Supplies of boneless skinless breasts from nearby production were adequate for the light demand, production from farther away was readily available, offered at lower prices, and not clearing. The undertone was quite unsettled. Line run breasts were at least adequate but most buyers limited receipts to standing commitments. Trading was at current prices. 




