LIGHT EXPORT DEMAND FOR CORN UNDERPINNED PRICES AND HOPES FOR RUSSIAN BUSINESS IS ALSO A PLUS. RAINY MIDWEST WEATHER THIS WEEK HAS DELAYED BEAN HARVEST AND PUSHED PRICES HIGHER BUT DRYER OUTLOOK, LIMITED PRICE GAINS. LIGHT FAR-MER SELLING AND NEWS RUSSIA MAY SOON TENDER FOR ADDITION-AL U.S. SOYMEAL, POSITIVE FOR PRICES.




