The meeting will resume on Friday morning, Nov. 19, at 7 a.m. with the Young Cooperator Breakfast Program. At this time, the 1993 Agricultural Communicator Award will be presented and the 1993 Outstanding Young Cooperator will be honored. Guest speaker is Lanny Fratarre, a radio announcer for Fittsburgh Pirates baseball.
