Lebanon County Holds Annual Extension Banquet

Lancaster Farming Staff MYERSTOWN (Lebanon Co.) - Lebanon County Extension held its annual banquet Monday evening at the Myerstown Church of the Brethren to a record turnout, according to director Alletta Schadler.

About 300 people attended the evening banquet and business meeting, including state Sen. David Brightbill, and Rep. Peter Zug. No county commissioners were present.

Dr. Paul Wangsness, the capital region director, gave a welcome and address, praising the Lebanon County Extension program, which he said is recognized as a leader in community involvement and outreach.

"We assume that people know

what we do in Lebanon County Extension, and we assume they know about what we do at Penn State," he said, adding that it can be easy to take for granted the extension program, which is being used as a prototype for other former Communist Bloc countries to aid in the transition to a market

"Tell people what Extension has done for you and what it can do for them," he said.

Schadler said that Lebanon County Extension recognizes the support the program receives from the citizens it serves and their political representatives.

"We're really fortunate we have the resources available to us through Penn State University through our tax dollars, and from the county commissioners through our tax dollars," Schadler said.

The budget for Lebanon Extension program last year was \$119,688, except for the rental on the 2-year-old ag center building. Rent for the year was \$78,500.

Except for Delbert Voight, who was hired last week to serve as the county's agronomic specialist and is expected to be working with USDA Soil Conservation Service as nutrient management planning gets underway, the county's extension staff consists of three fulltime people who serve within the county; five whose main office is in Lebanon, but who serve a multicounty region; three secretaries and two summer assistants.

There are also five consultants who receive payment with funds appropriated by the Lebanon County Commissioners and funds generated by user fees.

In order to qualify as a Master Gardner, an applicant must receive at least 13 hours of instruction and give at least 50 hours of community service helping to answer gardening questions and assisting other countians with their horticulural needs.

Discussion items include receiving an update on its consumptive use plan; a report on the






