DAILY NATIONAL GRAIN SUMMARY GRAIN AND SOYBEAN PRICES SOARED AFTER USDA'S CROP PRODUCTION AND SUPPLY/ DEMAND REPORTS RELEASED TUESDAY AND IMPROVED EXPORT DEMAND. WHEAT 7 TO 14 CENTS HIGHER. CORN 10 TO 13 CENTS HIGHER. SORGHUM 18 TO 21 CENTS HIGHER. SOYBEANS 27 TO 40 CENTS HIGHER. WHEAT PRICES WERE PUSHED SHARPLY HIGHER ON STRONGER CORN AND BEAN PRICES AS WELL AND MUCH IMPROVED EXPORT DEMAND FOR WHEAT. THE USDA SLIGHTLY REDUCED ITS 1993-94 WHEAT ENDING STOCKS FROM 697 MILLION BUSHELS LAST MONTH TO 682 MILLION BUSHELS IN YESTERDAY'S REPORT. CORN AND BEAN PRICES REACTED EXPLOSIVELY TO THE REDUCED CROP PRODUCTION AND STOCKS FIGURES IN TUESDAY'S USDA REPORTS. EXPORT DEMAND IMPROVED TODAY, FOR BOTH CORN AND BEANS. HARVEST CONTINUES TO PROGRESS BUT SOME

EXPORT NEWS: SOUTH KOREA BOUGHT 9,900 TONNES SOFT WHITE WHEAT, 9,900 TONNES HARD RED WINTER WHEAT AND 1,700 TONNES SPRING WHEAT FOR DEC/JAN SHIPMENT. THE USDA ACCEPTED THREE BIDS TO SELL 100,065 TONNES HARD RED WINTER WHEAT TO LEBANON, UNDER EEP, FOR NOV/JULY SHIPMENT. THE USDA ACCEPTED FIVE BIDS TO SELL 50,129 TONNES HARD RED WINTER WHEAT TO SUBSAHARAN AFRICAN NATIONS UNDER EEP FOR NOV/ DEC SHIPMENT. THE USDA ACCEPTED FOUR BIDS TO SELL 54,000 TONNES HARD RED WINTER WHEAT TO EGYPT UNDER EEP FOR DEC/JAN SHIPMENT. THE USDA ACCEPTED A BID TO SELL 25,450 TONNES NORTHERN/ DARK NORTHERN SPRING WHEAT AND 9,550 TONNES WESTERN WHITE WHEAT TO THE PHILIPPINES UNDER EEP FOR JANUARY SHIPMENT. SOUTH KOREA BOUGHT 50,000 TONNES U.S. CORN FOR DECEMBER SHIPMENT. TUNISIA BOUGHT 75,000 TONNES OPTIONAL ORIGIN BARLEY FOR DEC/FEB SHIPMENT. TAIWAN BOUGHT 23,000 TONNES U.S. NO. 2 YELLOW CORN FOR DEC/JAN SHIPMENT. 120,000 METRIC TONS OF SOYBEANS WERE SOLD TO UNKNOWN DESTINATION FOR 93/94 MARKETING YEAR. THE USDA ACCEPTED A BID TO SELL 6,000 TONNES OF SOYBEAN OIL TO ALGERIA UNDER EEP FOR NOV/DEC SHIPMENT. THE USDA ACCEPTED A BID TO SELL 1,500 TONNES OF COTTONSEED OIL TO EL SALVADOR UNDER THE COTTONSEED OIL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR DEC/ JAN SHIPMENT.
