DAILY NATIONAL GRAIN SUMMARY WHEAT PRICES FINISHED MIXED, WEDNESDAY WITH EGYPT'S SUBSTANTIAL PURCHASE ADDING SUPPORT. CORN AND SOYBEAN PRICES PICKED UP SUPPORT FROM NEWS RUSSIA MAY BE OFFERED NEW CREDITS FOR U.S. GRAINS. WHEAT MIXED. CORN 1 TO 7 CENTS HIGHER. SORGHUM 1 TO 2 CENTS HIGHER. SOYBEANS 2 TO 9 CENTS HIGHER. FOREIGN DEMAND GREATLY IMPROVED FOR WHEAT DUE TO EGYPT'S LARGE PURCHASE OF SOFT WHITE AND SOFT RED WINTER WHEAT. IDEAS RUSSIA WILL BID FOR ADDITIONAL U.S. WHEAT ALSO ADDED SUPPORT. WINTER WHEAT EMERGENCE IS REPORTED TO BE AHEAD OF LAST YEAR AND CROP DOING WELL. CORN AND SOYBEAN PRICES REBOUNDED FROM RECENT SHARP DECLINES BOOSTED BY POSSIBILITY THAT RUSSIA WILL SOON BE APPROVED FOR ADDITIONAL CREDITS FOR U.S. GRAINS. EXPORT DEMAND IS VERY LIGHT FOR CORN AND BEANS AT THIS TIME.

EXPORT NEWS: THE USDA ACCEPTED 11 BIDS TO SELL 399,750 TONS OF SOFT WHITE WHEAT AND 149,750 TONS SOFT RED WINTER WHEAT TO EGYPT UNDER BEP FOR FEB/APRIL SHIPMENT. EGYPT BOUGHT 300,000 METRIC TONS SOFT

WHITE WHEAT AND 100,000 SOFT RED WINTER WHEAT FOR 93/94 MARKETING YEAR. TAIWAN BOUGHT 54,000 TONS OF U.S. NO. 2 YELLOW SOYBEANS FOR SHIPMENT IN DEC. EGYPT BOUGHT 20,000 TONS OPTIONAL-ORIGIN SOYBEAN OIL AND 5,000 TONS OPTIONAL-ORIGIN SUNOIL FOR JANUARY SHIPMENT. THE USDA ANNOUNCED IT WOULD DONATE ABOUT 2,500 TONS OF BUTTER AND 5,500 OF BUTTEROIL TO RUSSIA FOR THE NEEDY PEOPLE IN RUSSIA'S AGRICULTURAL SECTOR.

A Note to the Tobacco Farmer:
Do you know how auction works? Do you know how tobacco is divided out at auction? If you don't please call Paradise Sale Barn and find out. Why does a tobacco buyer want to buy at your farm? Because he will buy for less on the farm. Consider your low grade - what are you getting on the farm?
First sale is December 6th! Let's fill the warehouse — it's important. First sale means a lot for season pricing. New crop! Good demand! Get your check that day. Sale starts at 10:00 am. Any tobacco not unloaded by 10:00 am might be sold next sale.

A Note To The Tobacco Buyer:
All tobacco buyers are welcome at Paradise Sales Barn. If you think the warehouse doesn't give you enough tobacco on sale day, then bid stronger on low grades or outgrade and see if auctioneer doesn't give you a larger percentage. Remember, all buyers are welcome in the warehouse - we aim to please.
We will have a grader at receiving door so bottom of skid is like the top of the skid. Our warehouse personnel are there to work for you - the buyer and the seller. We are not order takers - we will represent tobacco for you.

A Note From the Warehouse:
The farmer is the number one key in keeping tobacco barn going. If we don't get tobacco, we can not work for you - the farmer. All warehouse charges are the same.
Also, we welcome back for our 8th year - Mitch Ashby, auctioneer. We feel he is an important contributor in our warehouse.
