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Department of Environmental Resources (DER) manual on manure management. Early on, Graves helped prepare a handbook that set forth many of the standards and specifications related to free-stall housing for dairy cattle. As shown by his writings, he was a leader in developing animal treatment and handling systems while pointing out that attention had to be paid to the health and well-being of animals when designing structures and facilities for livestock.

The quality for his educational programs is evidenced by the 17 American Society of Ag Engineers (ASAE) Blue Ribbon Awards he has received and by the frequent invitations to present papers at regional, national and international meetings. Bob has authored or coauthored over 250 publications and developed numerous slide sets and computer programs in his educational efforts. He contributes regularly to the Dairy Science Extension newsletter for county agents and writes for Hoards Dairyman and other trade publications. Graves was chairman of the highly successful National Dairy Freestall Housing Symposium held in Harrisburg in 1986. He has contributed to a number of other statewide or regional workshops since that time. Most recently, a regional workshop on Expansion Strategies for Dairy Farms held in western Pennsylvania was most successful.

Bob was recognized by his peers when he received the 1993 Structures and Environment Award presented by the ASAE during its international meeting this past summer. The award is given each year to honor an individual who has demonstrated outstanding and meritorious achievements in agricultural structures and environment.

Bob is a member of the American Society of Ag Engineers, The American Dairy Science Association, Dairy Shrine, Gamma Sigma Delta and Alpha Zeta. Bob and his wife, Ann, live in State College.

Bob Rugaber, retired county agent from Butler, was the toastmaster. Walter Peechatka, state deputy secretary from PDA, and Dr. Lamartine Hood, dean at Penn State, brought greetings. Jennifer Grimes, state dairy princess, told of her love for farming, and Joyce Bupp, 1993 Women of the Year at the World Dairy Expo, and columnist for Lancaster Farming was the featured speaker. Bupp related the humorous side of farming with her experiences as a farm wife.
