

OTSS Broker-Bonnie's Tull Top Show

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. — Once again, the Limousin show at the National Western Stock Show in Denver January 14 lived up to its billing as one of the breed's premier shows of the year.

Randy Daniels of Colbert, Georgia evaluated 145 females and 61 bulls which comprised one of the deepest quality sets of Limousin ever paraded in Denver. Mike McGuire of Alabama served as the associate judge.

By the end of the show, spectators also had a chance to see just how widespread breed quality is from both a genetic and an exhibitor standpoint. Of the 16 division champions and reserve champions, 21 different owners were represented and 12 different sires.

For grand champion bull honors the judges went with their Division III champion, OTSS Broker 2124B. The 4/1/92 son of YKCC Top Line 180X is out of YKCL Miss Virginian R103V and is owned by Stewman Ranches of Maryneal, Texas. Broker made history with this win, becoming only the third Limousin bull in history to win the breed's prestigious Triple Crown, collecting grand championships at the All American Limousin Futurity, Louisville and Denver.

Four Bears PQ 86B was named Division III reserve champion and reserve grand champion bull overall at the halter of Lookout Limousin, Timber Lake, S.D. and MCM Limousin of Calgary, Alberta. Four Bears is a black 6/1/92 son of LKCC Tomahawk's Touchdown out of Lookout Billie 220R.

In the female show, Bonnie's Tull 202B, a 3/5/92 WRC Punch daughter out of TEXS Star Mercy was named Division III and grand champion female. Exhibitors were JCL Cattle Company of Welch, Okla.; H&L Limousin, Lebanon, Mo.; and Tullis Limousin Farm, Welch, Okla.

Sullivan Limousin of Dunlap, Iowa and Sennett Cattle Company of Waynetown, Ind. teamed up to show the Division I champion and reserve grand champion female overall with SLVL Sugar Cookie, a 3/8/93 daughter of Wulf's Challenger 6044Y out of EAFM Cookie.

Cane Ridge Polled Genie, a 4/23/93 daughter of Wulf's

Homerun 9226A out of Cane Ridge Temptress 404W, was named reserve champion female in Division I. Cane Ridge Cattle Company of Paris, Ky. and Yackley-Sugar Maple Leaf Limousin of Onida, S.D. and Millbrook, N.Y. were the exhibitors.

Magness Land and Cattle of Platteville, Colo. had the Division II champion female with MAGS Black and Satin, an 11/6/92 daughter of PLLP Polled Webster 30X out of WLCC Xpose 41X.

For reserve champion honors in Division II the judges went with CLLL Touch of Satin, a 9/20/92 daughter of LKCC Tomahawk's Touchdown out of Wulf's Black Satin. Minerich Land and Cattle Company of Richmond, Ky. was the exhibitor.

Dorminy Brothers Land and Cattle Company of Fitzgerald, Ga. teamed up with Express Limousin Ranches of Yukon, Okla. to show the reserve champion female in Division III. DBRO Blackberry Magic 30B is a 7/15/92 daughter of WLCC Mowtown Magic 11X out of OLC Blackberry Punch.

OAKM Lady Michelle 825B, a 1/21/92 TEXS Ranger Ted daughter out of TEXS Star Music was named Division IV champion female. Owners are Sullivan Limousin, Express Limousin Ranches and Shane Lindsey of Colfax, Iowa.

Minerich Land and Cattle Company rounded out the female show with the reserve champion in Division IV, OAKM Lady Paulette 814B, a 1/16/92 Harvest Olympus daughter out of OAKM Miss Prissy 285V.

In the bull show, the Minerich firm teamed up with CMC Cattle and Land Company of McDonough, Georgia to show the Division I champion, YKCC Polled Blueprint 314, a 3/23/93 son of YKCC Polled Cash 558Y out of YKCL Miss Mallory 127U.

The Polled Arrow Group of Wall Lake, Iowa led out the reserve champion bull in Division I with YKCC Polled Arrow 200C, a 3/31/93 son of YKCC Top Line 180X out of YKCC Vintage Wine 406X.

JCL Black Out, a 9/15/92 son of LKCC Tomahawk's Touchdown out of JCL Madeline was named champion bull in Division II for

JCL Cattle Company and Deer Valley Farm of Fayetteville, Tenn.

Keeler Limousin of Fairfax, Oklahoma had the reserve champion bull in Division II with TRAK Polled Buster, an 11/22/92 son of PLLP Polled Webster 30X out of CLLL Jasmine.

In Division IV, Magness Land and Cattle teamed up with Ramos

Limousin of Chihuahua, Mexico to show the champion bull with MAGS Bojangles, a 1/9/92 WLCC Turbo son out of MK Upsy In Command.

The reserve champion bull in Division IV was Blazer SLBO 512B, a 2/21/92 son of LML Patriot's Missile 960X out of Heidi BUIT 12T. Shane Lindsey and Bur Oak Limousin of Colfax,

Iowa were the exhibitors.

Minerich Land and Cattle Company exhibited the best five head in group competition.

Magness Land and Cattle was named the premier breeder and premier exhibitor of the show.

Jim Wulf of Morris, Minnesota was named Limousin's Herdsman of the Year at the show.

National All-Jersey Names Assistant General Manager

sonnel in the industry, from policymakers in Washington, to dairy plant managers, cheesemakers, and producers from Maine to California," said Covington.

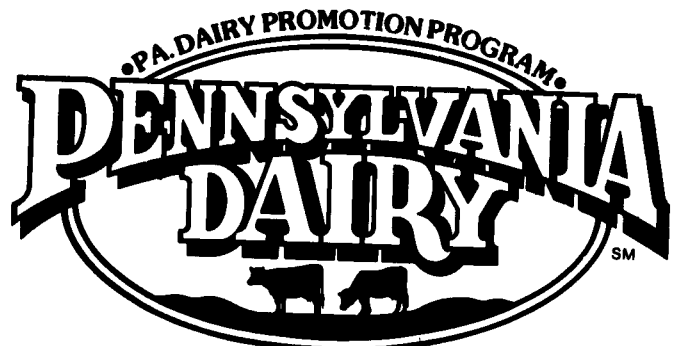
As director of economic research for AG-NOMICS Research, New Brighton, Minn., Brown specialized in economic analysis and dairy forecasting.

Brown served four years (1987-1991) as director of member services and economist with the National Milk Producers Federation in Arlington, Va. In addition to providing communica-

tion and member services, he developed a dairy statistical database and issued reports on farm costs/returns, industry impact studies, and market outlooks.

"Jersey producers will be well served by Mike's combined knowledge of the production side and grasp of dairy economics and regulatory policy," Covington said.

Brown earned a bachelor's degree in dairy science, summa cum laude, from Virginia Tech, Blacksburg, Virginia.



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
