AN ENTERPRISING YOUNG MAN

n February 26, 1829, a baby was born in Buttenheim, Germany, whose name would one day be known around the world. When young Levi Strauss arrived in San Francisco in the 1850s, he sold cotton canvas for tents. But miners' trousers suffered more wear and tear than their tents, so he stitched his sturdy cloth into pants. The fabric, milled in Genoa, Italy, was referred to as "genes." In the 1860s Strauss substituted a softer fabric from Nimes, France, known as

serge de Nimes, ("denim" in this country). Strauss dyed the neutral-colored fabric indigo blue to camouflage soil stains, and later 31 added reinforcing rivets at pockets and crotch. The crotch rivet was quickly eliminated when miners complained that squatting too near a campfire resulted in dangerously hot rivets.

OKLAHOMA NATIONAL STOCKYARDS WEEKLY CATTLE SUMMARY: Compared to last week: Feeder steers and steer calves \$1.00 to mostly \$2.00 higher. Heifers steady to \$1.00 higher, advance on those over 700 lbs.. Quality of supply average thru attractive. Cattle carried more fill and flesh than last week. Calves were softer than last week's hard supply. Stocker and calf demand continues very strong despite need for moisture across the state. This week marked the first upturn on feeder steers since December 6 and halted a \$4.00 per CWT downturn since that time. Feeder heifers have remained fairly stable thruout this period. Slaughter cows under excellent demand and firm to \$2.00 higher. Slaughter bulls steady to \$1.00 higher. Receipts this week: 9,350; last week 9,670; last year 4,415. Supply consisted of 81 percent yearlings over 600 lbs.; 15 percent calves and stockers under 600 lbs.; 4 percent cows and bulls. Prices follow with weighted average weight and price in parenthesis.




