CLAYTON, N.J. — A cider school, tailored for the small scale juice processor will be conducted on March 16, at American Cyanamid Agricultural Center in Princeton. ## Deadline For Disaster Request Nears

LEBANON (Lebanon Co.) — Corn and sorghum producers who suffered disaster losses during 1993 have only until March 4 to request federal assistance through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

That announcement was made last week by Grant Buntrock, administrator of the ASCS.

According to Buntrock, those who request assistance will gain eligibility for possible forgiveness

of overpayments they may have received in advance for deficiencies.

"Even if the disaster loss was not large enough to qualify for disaster payment, it may mean eligibility for some advance deficiency overpayment forgiveness," Buntrock said in a recent statement.

The USDA prohibits discrimination in its programs on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, and marital or familial status.
