Trade sentiment was steady to firm. In the parts complex, supplies were irregularly balanced from plant to plant.

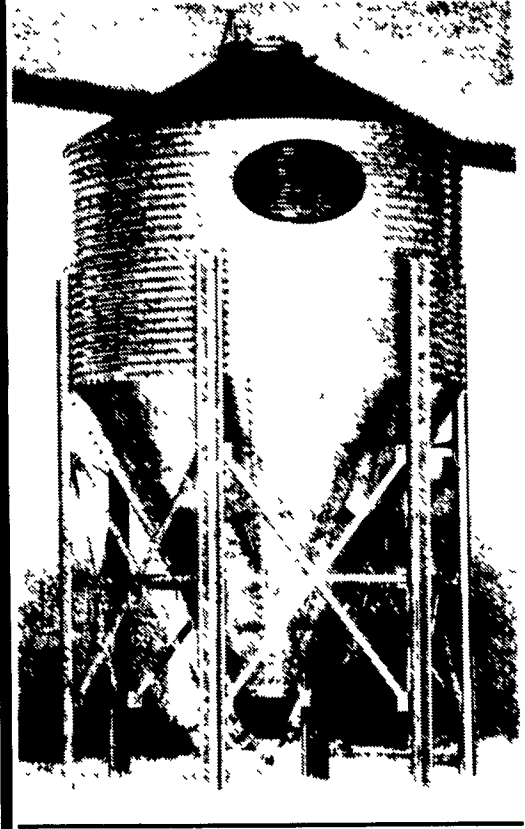
