

The IICA has been encouraging ice cream manufacturers to help extend the promotion in stores, and ADA informed the grocery trade of the promotion.

Besides the retail consumer promotion, the National Dairy Board will kick off anohter cam-

paign in March. However, this ice cream promotion will target the foodservice channel.

"Consumers spend nearly half of their food dollars out-of-home, and the foodservice channel (i.e., restaurants, hospital cafeterias) accounts for about 60 percent of all ice cream sales, so this is another important market to hold onto and expand," said Bill Underwood, New York dairy farmer and chair of the Board's Advertising & Sales Promotion Committee.

Instead of only running ads in foodservice trade publications as it did in the past, the National Dairy Board will join Hershey in providing merchandising materials like menu clips/inserts and

posters, since ice cream is rare, promoted at the point of sale in foodservice.

Ads featuring an offer for the merchandising materials and recipe contest will appear in issues of Restaurant Business and other trade publications from March-August.

Besides covering 40 percent of the tab, Hershey's sales force will provide additional support to the foodservice promotion, leveraging the dairy farmer checkoff. Hershey's sales force will work directly with foodservice suppliers and operators, providing the personal contact that will help this program succeed in selling more
