

STATE COLLEGE (Centre Co.) — The smart choice for today's dairyman who is looking to the future is AM-PM testing through the Pa. Dairy Herd Improvement Association (Pa.DHIA).

AM-PM testing works because dairymen, using this method of testing cow and herd production, save time and money, and they also receive the same management records as the dairymen who use 2X DHI testing.

In addition, the AM-PM testing records are official with some breed associations (if a technician is present to record the data).

For AM-PM plans, two milking times must be recorded — the time of the actual milking that is to be weighed and tested, and the time of milking just previous.

These two times are recorded in order to make proper calculations

for estimated sample-day yields and percentages.

The time of milking and the amount of time between milkings influences factors which are used, along with measured milk weights and the percentages of milk components, to make sample-day calculations.

The way the program works, on a practical basis, is that the AM-PM program requires a technician to test one milking per month.

Every other month, the technician switches from testing the morning milking to testing the evening milking (thus the AM-PM name).

When the technician actually comes to test the herd, what is recorded are milk weights, management data, and the previous milking time. The more accurate the information provided the technician, the more accurate the

report the dairyman gets and can put to use.

On test day, milk samples also are taken and sent to Pa.DHIA's Central Milk Testing Laboratory for analysis.

Results of the tested milk samples, along with the other information gathered during test day, are processed through the Dairy Records Processing Center.

The milk, fat and protein content values reported are factored to

represent 24-hour production.

The main advantage of this type of test is that it saves the dairyman money, and it takes up less of his time.

Other Testing Programs

Included with Pa.DHIA AM-PM testing (Code 31) are three variations — DHIA Milk-only (Code 33); DHIA Milk-Only AM-PM (Code 34); and DHIR AM-PM.

Herds participating in any of these testing variations have to follow certain test procedures.

Milk weights and samples are to be obtained for all cows on each test day (this is as prescribed in NCDHIP Rule 4), with the exceptions that a milking interval recorder is not required, and for those enrolled in "DHIA Milk-only," no milk samples are taken for component testing.

All herd data is collected by DHIA field technicians. Those using Milk-only are to follow the same guidelines.

As far as any special procedures or data required, bulk tank shipment milk weights must be reported by the producer (as described in the NCDHIP rules, Appendix 2).

Those wishing copies of the NCDHIP Rules can call the state office, order through the gray manual, "Understanding Your DHIA Report," or by ordering through your technician on the next test day.

How Does Your Herd Compare?

STATE COLLEGE (Centre Co.) — These data are calculated using information pulled from Pennsylvania DHIA's mainframe computer each week. It is a one-week summary representing approximately one-fourth of the herds on test, as they are tested monthly.

These data are valuable from a business management standpoint and can be used for comparing your operations to the averages from about one-fourth of the herds across the state.


