

Sheep Shearing School One thing is certain each year when it comes to raising sheep . . . shearing time!

Traditionally in Pennsylvania, the bulk of sheep are shorn in the spring and, as usual, extension agents get calls from flock owners searching for someone to perform the shearing task. Perhaps a way to solve this problem is for shepherds to learn the art themselves.

For the seventh time in eight vears, the Lancaster County Sheep and Wool Grower's Association and Penn State Cooperative Extension will conduct a two-day sheep shearing school for area shepherds. During the past seven years, 116 individuals have been instructed in the art of sheep shearing at the Lancaster County school.

The school will be held on Friday, April 8 and Saturday, April 9 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days at the Rod Nissley sheep flock near Campbelltown, Lebanon County, Mike Fournier, Bucks County extension agent, will serve as instructor for the school.

Cost for the school is \$15 for members of LSCWGA and \$25 for non-members. Shearing equipment will be provided by Penn State University.

Lamb Marketing Cooperative Meeting

The mission of the Pennsylvania Sheep and Lamb Marketing Program is to strengthen and support the state's sheep industry through market development and livestock research. An extensive study of retail, ethnic, and mailorder market opportunities for Pennsylvania lamb was conducted by the Program's Market Development Steering Committee.

From this, sufficient market demand was found to warrant furtherbusiness planning for a cooperative marketing association and a statewide survey was conducted to determine production practices, number of lambs sold, and interest in being involved in a lamb marketing venture.

Survey results indicated that 69 producers that marketed 8,853 lambs are interested in a marketing cooperative by the apparent willingness to finance it with upfront initial investment. Survey respondents appeared willing to adjust lambing schedules and alter management practices to provide

a consistent supply of lamb on a year-round busis.

Currently, the steering committee is conducting meetings across the state to discuss the marketing cooperative idea with sheep producers. A meeting for southeast Pennsylvania is being hosted by the Lancaster County Sheep and Wool Grower's Association and Penn State Cooperative Extension at 7 p.m. on April 11 at the Lancaster Farm and Home Center.

This marketing alternative session entitled "Getting The Most From Your Lambs" will be conducted by Larry Yager, Penn State extension marketing specialist. His guests will be John Shoemaker, Allensville and Charlie Cathcart, Dry Run, members of the Green Valley Lamb Marketing Cooperative.

This is an important meeting for southeast sheep producers to attend if there is a true desire to organize a lamb marketing cooperative in Pennsylvania.

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vioral trials or for growing various genetic stocks in preparation for moving into the cages are also located in this building.

The Processing Building is setup for slaughtering broilers and turkeys. Batch rather than in-line equipment will be used as relatively small numbers of birds will be processed at any one time, generally for determining yield and for collecting various tissues and organs for further analyses.

In addition to the above mentioned rooms and equipment, each building contains a laboratory where preliminary analyses can be conducted, as well as sample preparation for more involved studies to be performed in the departmental laboratories on campus.
