righty-five years ago on April 6, 1909, Robert E. Peary and his small band of Arctic explorers finally became the first men to reach the North Pole. Or did they? For over eighty years controversy has surrounded Peary's claim Upon returning from the Pole, Peary learned that Dr Frederick Cook (who served as physician on one of Peary's Greenland expeditions) claimed to have reached the Pole in April 1908. Although Cook's claim was finally discounted by most authorities, critics continued to question whether Peary actually reached the Pole - some felt he may have missed it by as much as 60 miles. In December 1989, after exhaustive investigation, the Navigation Foundation concluded that "Peary,

Matt Henson, and the four Eskimos went to the Pole together, just as they all maintained for the rest of their lives '


