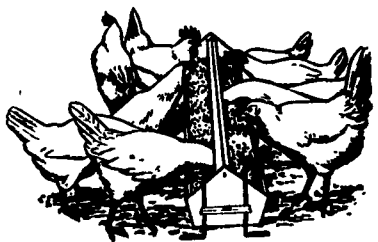

Trucklot buying interest was quite irregular. Supplies of boneless skinless breasts with tenders were in close balance with current needs. Asking prices and trading was reported at higher prices. Heavier breast cutlets without tenders packed in trays or ice were available and slow to clear. Sized product was short of needs. That side of the market was steady. Line run breasts were extremely tight. Shippers asked sharply higher market related prices. Some product was booked at the higher prices but some buyer resistance was noted. Most dark meat items traded at steady prices. Wings were short of needs, prices trended higher.

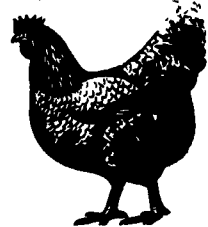
