WEDNESDAY MAY 4, 1994 WHEAT PRICES REBOUNDED WEDNESDAY DUE TO IMPROVED OUTLOOK FOR RUSSIAN EX- PORT BUSINESS. CORN PRICES FINISHED MIXED AND SOYBEAN PRICES JUMPED SHARPLY HIGHER ON PRO-FIT TAKING ON THE BOARD. WHEAT 5 T & CENTS HIGHER. CORN MIXED. SORGHUM 1 TO 5 CENTS HIGHER. SOYBEANS 2 TO 9 CENTS HIGHER. NEWS THAT RUSSIA MAY NEED FROM 1 TO 3 MILLION TONNES U.S. WHEAT SOON, BOOST- ED WHEAT PRICES. EARLIER REPORTS THAT RUSSIA HAD DEFAULTED ON PAY-MENTS WERE TEMPORARY AND COULD EASILY BE RECTIFIED. CORN PRICES RECEIVED SUPPORT FROM SPILLOVER STRENGTH FROM WHEAT PRICES AND IDEAS THAT RUSSIA'S PURCHASE OF U.S. WHEAT WOULD LIMIT THE USE OF WHEAT IN LIVESTOCK FEED RATIONS. THIS IN TURN WOULD

INCREASE CORN USAGE AND TIGHTEN STOCKS. SOME PRESSURE WAS NOTED DUE TO RAPID PLANT-ING PROGRESS IN MIDWEST AREAS AND EXPECTATIONS FOR MORE CORN TO BE PLANTED THAN ORIGI-NALLY PLANNED. SHARP INCREASE IN SOYBEAN PRICES DUE TO INDI-CATIONS RUSSIA MAY PURCHASE U.S. MEAL ALONG WITH WHEAT. SOME PROFIT TAKING ON THE BOARD WAS ALSO A FACTOR IN HIGHER PRICES.
