

**Driving Clinic**

Dauphin County 4-H will be hosting a Horse Driving Clinic on Tuesday, June 21, at Twin Brooks. This clinic will be part of a series sponsored by the State 4-H Horse Program Committee. 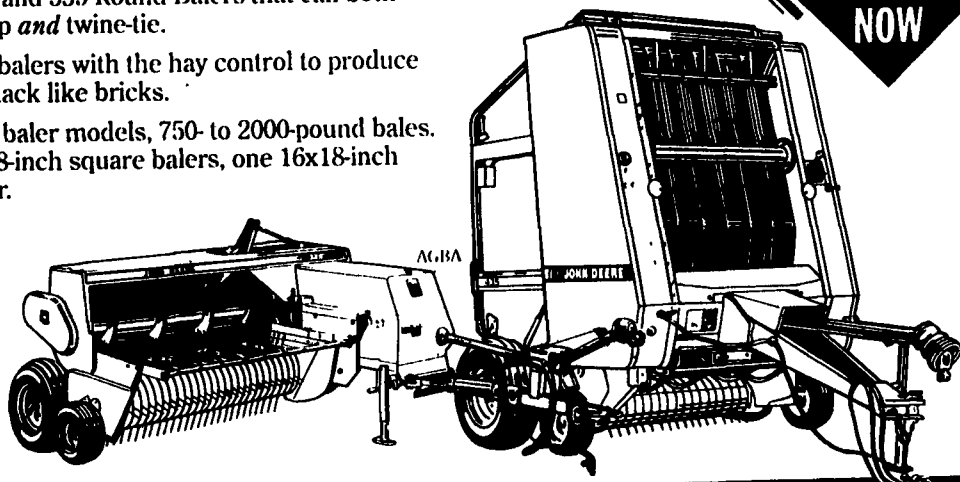
