On Friday, June 1, 1638, 2:00 P.M., the first recorded earthquake in America rocked the settlement at Plymouth, Massachusetts. Governor William Bradford reported this event in his *History of the Plymouth Plantation*. "However, it was very terrible for ye time, and as ye men were set talking in ye house, some women and others were without ye doors, and ye earth shooke with ye violence as they could not stand without catching hold of ye posts and pails yt stood next them, but ye violence lasted not long. And about halfe an hower, or less, came an other noyse & shaking, but neither so loud nor strong as ye former, but quickly passed over, and so it ceased."

TIP OF THE WEEK

Clean dirty, streaking windshield wipers by scrubbing with baking soda and water.

EARTHWISE

Dogs and cats just naturally mark their territories. If your shrubs and gardens are considered part of their turf, here's an easy, nontoxic way to redraw the boundary lines. Grind a few cloves of garlic and 3 or 4 red hot peppers in the blender. Combine this mixture and a few drops of dishwashing liquid in a bucketful of water. Sprinkle around your garden and bushes. Your furry friends will seek out greener (and less aromatic) pastures.



OLD FASHIONED SODA CRACKERS

- 4 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup sour milk
- 1 cup butter

Sift together dry ingredients. Cut in milk and butter, mixing well to form a stiff dough. (To sour fresh milk, add 1 scant tablespoon vinegar or lemon juice.) Roll and turn over repeatedly until the dough is very stiff. Roll very thin, cut into squares, and prick with a fork. Bake at 400° F until the edges are lightly browned.

Makes about 50 to 60 crackers

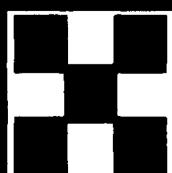
