N.J. State FFA Convention More than 325 FFA members. advisors, and guests attended the 65th Annual N.J. State FFA Convention held on the Cook Campus of Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N.J. from May 23-25.

During the three-day convention, FFA members from across the state gathered to conduct business and honor fellow members for their achievements.

More than \$11,000 in college scholarships were awarded to FFA members with an additional \$5000 in awards presented to FFA chapters and individuals. Scholarships and awards were sponsored by State and National FFA Foundations, the State FFA Association, and other agricultural organizations.






