Crop, Weather Report

FOR THE WEEK ENDING JUNE 26

GOOD WEEK FOR FIELDWORK: There were five days suitable for fieldwork. Scattered showers and thunderstorms gave most sections some rainfall, but amounts varied from a few tenths to around 2 inches. Average temperature for the state was above normal for the 16th week in a row. Soil moisture was rated short by 63 percent of our respondents, adequate by 36 percent, and surplus by 2 percent. These were the driest conditions reported this year and many crops were suffering from the heat and low soil moisture. Activities included planting soybeans, transplanting tobacco, making hay, spraying corn, spreading fertilizer, hauling manure, and caring for livestock.

LIVESTOCK: Pasture feed available was poor to fair and continued to decline because of the hot, dry weather. Many farmers were feeding supplemental hay to livestock because of the poor recovery of pasture.

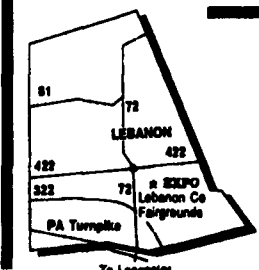
