Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was light on 3 pound and smaller sizes. Heavier sizes were barely adequate. Live supplies were moderate, with weights ranging light to desirable. Processing schedules were very heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were lower at 53 to 63 cents. Trade sentiment was barely steady to weak. Breast items were barely adequate to weak with bone-in breast in the longest position. Dark meat items were available with some improvement noted for next week. Wings were adequate.
