CHICAGO, Ill. — Meaningful value-based marketing is one step closer, thanks to the National Beef Instrument Assessment Plan announced by the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

Reliable instrument assessment is a critical link in the process of accurately predicting eating quality of beef products, according to J.O. Reagan, director of product technology research, National Live Stock and Meat Board.

"Industry must accurately measure high-value traits before producers can be paid for them," said Gary C. Smith, university distinguished professor occupying the Monfort Endowed Chair, Colorado State Universitiy and chair of the National Beef Instrument Assessment Palnning Committee.

Instrument assessment involves the use of various tools and instruments to measure important characteristics of beef. The goal is to develop tools to accurately measure the factors that predict the quality and eating pleasure of beef, such as marbling, composition and tenderness. Part of the instrument assessment research process includes basic research work

Pa.-Bred Bull Enters Select Sires Program

PLAIN CITY, Ohio - 7H4831 C&M-R-Run Targ Granger-ET *TL, a yound sire bred by Michael Hoover of Tyrone, PA, has been chosen to enter Select Sires' Program for Genetic Advancement (PGA) sire sampling system. Based on his outstanding pedigree, 7H4831 has been selected as one of 200 Holstein bulls from throughout the United States to enter the program in 1994.

Expect daughters of 7H4831 to be high protein producers, as he is sired by Target and his dam completed a record over 27,950M with 3.6% protein. The dam, a Rotate daughter, is scored Excellent (90) with an Excellent udder. The maternal grandam, a Ned Boy, is scored (VG-85-EX-MS-DOM) and has averaged 3.5% protein in two lactations. 7H4831 is bred to sire lots of high-solids milk and correct udders, feet and legs.
