QUARRYVILLE (Lancaster Co.) — For the Alan McCauley family and their New Direction Holsteins, the Lancaster County Holstein Show was a success. They had the grand champion, reserve grand champion, and numerous first-place wins to help them capture both premier breeder and premier exhibitor banners.

For the grand champion, Judge David Castrogiovanni from Montrose in Susquehanna County, picked the tall, dark, beautiful New Direction Jet Cameo to repeat last year's win. Cameo showed as a five year-old, and ringside observers called her "every bit as good as last year."

Reserve champion was New Direction Star Bobo-ET top of the senior three year-old class.

Warns Mark Carolyn was the grand champion of the junior division for Joseph Best. Carolyn was also the grand champion of the Lancaster 4-H Holstein Show a day earlier. Reserve champion of the junior division was Myerose Cavemena Katherine-Red for Jason Wivell.

Hilltop-Heritage Sassy was the junior champion of the show for Heather Brubaker. Sassy topped the winter calf class. Reserve junior champion was shown by Star Rock Farms. Wyeview Raider Courtney topped the fall calf class.

Judge Castrogiovanni called his class of winners representative of the true type Holstein. The quality was good, but the numbers were down, officials said, because of the BVD scare and hot weather.

QUARRYVILLE (Lancaster Co.) — Although the number of entries was down at the Lancaster County 4-H dairy show held Wednesday at the Solanco Fairgrounds in Quarryville, the quality of animals shown was strong, according to judge Curtis Day, of Shippensburg.

The low number of animals, due

to precautions of bovine virus diarrhea, caused the colored breeds shows to be handled as one show, instead of the usual individual breed shows.

The senior and grand champion Holstein was shown by Joe Best, of Holtwood, who showed his 4-year-old Warns Mark Carolyn for the first place win.

The reserve grand champion was a senior 3-year-old, Myerose

Cavemena Katherine Red, shown by Jason Wivell, of Elizabethtown.

Marsha Balmer, of Manheim, showed her intermeditate calf, Leh-Mer-Pine Proker Pom Pom to win the junior champion title, while Heather Brubaker, of Manheim, showed her intermediate calf for a reserve junior championship title.
