
QUESTION — Dennis Williams, Liverpool, wants to know how to remove kerosene soot from interior painted drywall.

QUESTION - Sarah Clark, Breezewood, would like to know if there is a way to break a dog of being afraid of thunder and lightning. The Clarks have tried letting the dog outside during the storm, but it hasn't helped.

ANSWER — Walter Hertzog, King of Prussia, asked how to get rid of bamboo in his yard that is running shoots everywhere. He also asks where to purchase clump bamboo that doesn't run. Thanks to Laura Wood, York, who answered this question. She writes that it sounds as if Hertzog has monopodial bamboo, which can be controlled by constructing an underground cement wall surrounding the area in which he wants it. The wall should be 3/4 -inch wide and 18-inches deep with wire screen inside the form to keep it from cracking later.

He may also contact a landscape supplier and sell the plants to them. They would also know where to get the sympodial type of bamboo that forms clumps.
