

# Gallon Of Milk Supreme Champion Sells For \$500

TROY (Bradford County) —

The price of milk was up at the Troy Fair last week as one gallon of the "white gold" from the supreme champion dairy cow sold

for \$500.

Pelton Trucking gave the top bid for the milk produced from Jill Sheeley's champion, Braund Valley Dale Kayla.

The milk was sold through the Bradford County Milk Auction, a program that is in its third year in Bradford County. The proceeds of the auction are divided between the county 4-H or FFA program, the owner of the animal and the owner's local 4-H club or FFA chapter.

Quarts of milk were sold from the grand and reserve grand champions of the youth show as well.

Cortland Tire gave the final bid of \$175 for the milk produced from Matthew Watson's grand champion Jersey, Miles Dolly of Little Pond. The milk from the grand champion Ayrshire, BEKA Madison's Miracle, owned by Melissa Hillyard, commanded a bid of \$100 from Cross Roads Equipment.

The reserve champion Holstein, Braund Valley Potential Kel, owned by Aaron Shelley, produced a quart of milk which sold for \$175. Farm Credit of Towanda was the successful bidder.

Eastern Milk Producers purchased the milk from the reserve champion Jersey for \$125. The animal, Sunset Ridge Goldmaker Dolly is owned by Seth Harris.

Sunset Ice Cream purchased the milk from Karen Neville's reserve champion Ayrshire, Locust Lane

Gumdrop Gypsy for \$120.

In addition to the milk, baskets of Bradford County products were also sold to help raise money for the youth program.

Bradford Basket Company, Spring Creek Collection and Longaberger Basket Company each donated a basket which was filled

with products from Milky Way Farms, Roloson Maple Syrup, Lariner and Norton, the Bradford County Dairy Promotion Board, Warner Taffy and Hall's Fudge.

Troy Agway, Towanda Agway Crop Center and Pelton Trucking each bought a basket for \$60, \$105 and \$85 respectively.

## Field Days Emphasize Beef Quality

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — A series of Polled Hereford field days held this spring and summer has emphasized the importance of developing breeding programs to help cattlemen solve some of the problems described in the National Beef Quality Audit.

The American Polled Hereford Association (APHA) has drafted a policy which recommends that Polled Hereford breeders gear their breeding programs toward producing seedstock which will meet or exceed the industry requirements outlined in the audit.

"Of the \$280-loss per slaughter steer or heifer identified in the audit, nearly \$250 of this is a result of genetics," said Ed Bible, APHA president. "So we've struc-

tured our field day programs to address how our seedstock producers can help correct some of the industry problems such as lack of uniformity, excessive fat and low cutability and palatability."

The Polled Hereford events have featured industry and university experts, along with breed leaders, who have helped establish guidelines for industry improvement.

"These speakers stressed that our breeders take Polled Herefords' inherent advantages," Bible said, "such as fertility, polledness, efficiency, disposition and adequate muscling, and use them as a base for helping the industry build more consistency and quality into the end product."
