door skill-development games such as going through a team obstacle course that required teamthinking, cooperation and an understanding of leadership.

Stan Deen, an English, speech and drama instructor at Garden Spot High School, served as a motivational opening speaker. He challengd the youth to get excited, "to dream big dreams," to get involved, and to "soar like eagles" — the last statement being followed with the spreading of arms to indicate flight.


That symbol of flight persisted throughout the three-day conference.

Marci Harnish, daughter of Bob and Marti Harnish, of Manheim, is FFA state vice president. She attended the conference for the first time.

Harnish said that, while defining a "leader" is difficult, she has learned that, "A leader isn't a boss, a leader is a partner."

She said she also learned that anyone can be a leader and that many people are leaders, even though they may not be in the public spotlight.

"I think everybody has the ability to be a leader, they just use it in different ways," Harnish said Tuesday. "Even people who work behind the scenes, they are leaders.

As a state officer, Harnish said the experience of attending the conference was rewarding in ways other than what was expected.

"I thought it went very well. (The state officers') premier objective was to get members motivated to go back to their chapters and get their members involved, and to let them know about the opportunities that are available in FFA," she said, adding that the event also provided an opportunity for the 1994-95 officers, elected on June 16, to work together for the first time. Harnish said that added to her experience.

"I got to know the students. This was the first official thing (the 1994-95 state officers) did," she said. Through it, Harnish she learned better, " ... how we can interact. It gives (me) a better sense of how we are going to be working together.'

Harnish said she senses that it will be a good experience.

Jenny Zerby, daughter of Nevin and Isabel Zerby, of Beavertown, is president of the state FFA. It was also her first conference.

"I learned how to interact with the other kids and how to get them to open up and tell me what they like to do. I also saw how other picked up."

Zerby said she saw her role as instructor and participant. She said that she and the officers gave instruction on how to present awards, introduce guests or speak-
