
were on hand displaying and selling their wares. Various Ag Commodity displays were also featured with the crafts.



ANSWER — A reader wanted to know if someone has a grain scale that can be bought to weigh saffron or gunpowder. Thanks to Philip E. Wiegle, Pottstown, for suggesting that the reader go to a gun shop that sells reloading equipment. Powder scales are available from several companies such as RCBS, Dillon, Lee, Lyman, and Hornaday. All are accurate to one-tenth of a grain, and most can measure from 0-100 grains. Many different models are available, from simple balance scales costing about \$20 to electronic digital scales that start about \$150.
